Introduction

- A qualitative study showed the **importance of veterinarian support and councelling for the farmers** to assimilate and implement new practices (Fortané et al., 2015)
- A previous study showed that pig farmers who followed vet recommandations were always convinced by this measures and trusted them (Collineau et al., 2017)
- In human medecine, patients' trust in their physician is considered essential for good quality and effective medical care (Hillen et al., 2012).
- Several scales exists (Muller et al., 2014), whereas only one has been developped in a specific veterinary medecine for pets (Grand et al., 2013).

Objective: To develop the Trust in Veterinarian Scales (TiVS) to assess pig farmers' trust in their veterinarian

Scale construction process with the Churchill's Method

STEPS

First Step:

Bibliographic Research

on existing scales in human medicine and vet medicine

GOALS

- To understand the concept of trust
- To define the dimensions of trust
- To differentiate the "type" of trust (interpersonal organisational or institutional)

Results

41 items 7 dimensions explored:

competence, integrity, honesty, confidentiality, fidelity, caring and global trust

Second Step:

Qualitative study

4 veterinarians Focus Group (16 swine veterinarians in total)

21 farmers qualitative open-ended interviews

To improve TiVS first version from literature

- To explore vets' and farmers' perception
- To explore vets' and farmers' experiences
- To contextualize the scale in Veterinary medicine for the swine production

51 items adapted to the swine production context

7 dimensions with a new one "availability" and a merged dimension of honesty and integrity

Third and Fourth Step:

Test by experts and

Field validation study

(five couples of swine veterinarians and farmers)

Work in process

- To avoid redundancies and reduce the numbers of items for each dimension
- To test scale's feasibility and robustness
- To check item's symmetry and genericity

Conclusion

- TiVS is the first scale adapted to pig farmers' trust in veterinarian.
- Many factors have an impact: history, psychology, competence, economical context, production organisation, agricultural advisors...
- Trust between farmers and veterinarians is a dynamic concept, changing over time and circumstances.
- This scale could be used to identify the different levels and dimensions of trust.
- Assessing farmers' trust in their veterinarians is probably an essential step to improve adherence to treatments or recommendations and skateholder's decisions.
